

COVID-19 and Trainee Progression in 2020 (update II) – 17 April 2020

Please note this is primarily a UK-based document.

The JCST is an advisory body to the four Surgical Royal Colleges of the UK and Ireland. It works closely with the Statutory Education Bodies (SEBs), the General Medical Council (GMC), the Confederation of Postgraduate Schools of Surgery (CoPSS), and Trainee and Specialty Associations.

Trainees' wellbeing and provision remains a high priority for all and we are continuing to work to find the safest and most pragmatic solutions to the current situation. We hope the information below addresses some of the current queries and offers further support and clarity.

Wellbeing support

As mentioned in previous statements, local offices and deaneries encourage trainees to go to their Trust's or Health Board's Director or Associate Director of Medical Education, or to their Educational Supervisor, Training Programme Director, Associate Postgraduate Dean or Programme Support Unit, if they need additional support.

National Selection

Following recent discussions, the Medical and Dental Recruitment and Selection (MDRS) group decided that National Selection for General Surgery and Vascular Surgery will take place as described below. Please read the full statement from the four Statutory Education Bodies (SEBs) here.

For General Surgery and Vascular Surgery: candidates will be asked to complete a self-assessment form and upload primary evidence against the self-assessment domains. A cohort of candidates will have their evidence assessed and validated by clinicians. Candidates have already been contacted by the Medical and Dental Recruitment and Selection team to advise them of this process.

For all the other surgical specialties (with the exception of Core Surgery, Cardiothoracic Surgery, Neurosurgery and Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery for which selection was completed before the COVID-19 outbreak): self-assessment forms already formed part of the standard selection process and candidates would have submitted those ahead of the outbreak on the understanding that the self-assessments would have been reviewed at interview. For that reason, candidates in these specialties will not be asked to submit primary evidence and their application will be reviewed solely through the self-assessment form submitted.

Guidance for recording COVID-19 experience in ISCP

We have developed guidance on how you can, if you wish to do so, record your COVID-19 experience in ISCP. The guidance which you can read in full here includes the following:

- Recording a separate placement (COVID-19 re-deployment)
- Completion of the current Learning Agreement (LA)
- Use of workplace-based assessments (WBA)
- Recording COVID-19 workplace experience includes suggestions for using the ISCP and an ASiT designed logbook of experience

ARCPs management

The four Statutory Education Bodies (SEBs) are working with all Royal Colleges through the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges to finalise details for managing ARCPs this year. It is proposed that a new ARCP outcome is produced to recognise the adverse impact of COVID without penalising or holding back trainees' progress.

We hope to be able to release further details on ARCP management in due course.

Out of Programme (OOP)
